



Here is a summary of how this program works:

- Criminal Justice Courses are completely online
- Take one course every five weeks
- You determine the pace. Choose to finish your Bachelor's degree in as little as 18 months
- 120 hours to finish your degree

Transfer Credit:

- Transfer up to 83 hours of prior college credit
- Earn 9-32 hours of college credit for academy training (Corrections or Law Enforcement Academies)
- Earn up to 30 hours of college credit for POST certified training
- Earn up to 30 hours of college credit for CLEP / Dantes exams
- Earn up to 30 hours of college credit for Military Training
- \$350 per credit hour (\$1,050 per class)
- Tuition is ALL-INCLUSIVE, i.e. Books, Fees, Apple iPad 2 are included in the cost
- Apple iPad 2 given to all CJ students to complete coursework BUT is yours to KEEP!

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CRIMINAL JUSTICE DEGREE

The Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice is designed for working professionals who want to develop the skills needed for supervision and management. Those who are not working in the Criminal Justice career field may also utilize this program to complete a Bachelor Degree in Criminal Justice.

The program is rather unique as it is lectured by those who have authored the book used in the course. The students are provided an *iPad 2* that is included in the tuition after they have completed the program. The books are also included in the tuition cost. The facilitators (on line Professors) are professionals in Criminal Justice. Each facilitator has experience in the course topic and accessible to the students during the five week module. There are 16 courses that are required for the student to take to complete the CCJ requirement. Students that have completed a basic law enforcement training course or certified/approved corrections course required as a condition of employment can receive college credit for them. College credit can also be achieved by military training, other law enforcement/corrections training and in specialized training that is state approved.

This degree is currently is accredited with the Higher Learning Commission.

Emphasis Requirements:

Degree requirements for online students are as follows:

1. One hundred twenty (120) semester hours of credit.
2. A total of forty eight (48) upper division credit hours must be completed at the CJ degree completion program at Central Christian College.
3. Students may transfer other college credit hours to satisfy the general education requirements or electives.

CJ COURSES:

Introduction to online Criminal Justice Learning

This course is designed to provide the student with orientation and an overview of the online program. Review of the college policies, procedures and expectations are discussed. How to use the issued IPAD is provided.

Introduction to Criminal Justice

This course focuses on the formal crime control process in the United States. Students will examine the agencies (law enforcement, corrections, and judicial) and the processes involved with administering justice.

Introduction to Law Enforcement

The development of policing in the United States stressing the relationships of the law enforcement, politics, labor/personnel, reform movements and technological change.

Ethics in Law Enforcement

This course identifies and explores ethics and values in the Criminal Justice System. This course pays special attention to issues of social inequality. This course discusses remedial strategies and behavior relating to unethical behavior as it relates to individuals and groups.

Introduction to Corrections

This course outlines the history, current practices, and future directions of corrections in a systematic process showing the evolving changes within institutional and community based corrections. Other topics include the rights of the inmate, liability and the duties of a correctional officer.

Criminal Procedure I

This course addresses primarily on the rights protected by the fourth amendment. This includes constitutional aspects of criminal procedures that include investigations, arrests, searches and seizures.

Criminal Procedure II

This course addresses primarily on the rights protected by the sixth amendments. This includes right to trial, pre-trial, trial, functions of the prosecutor and defense attorneys,

Statistics in Criminal Justice

Descriptive and inferential statistics covering various techniques used in probability theory, testing, and data analysis used by criminal justice researchers and administrators.

Introduction to Forensic Science

Overview of general principles of forensic science, techniques, equipment and methodologies as used in the crime laboratories.

Police Administration

An organizational management and systems approach to the study of police administration. Emphasis is placed on organizational structures, resource management, operations, and leadership principles.

Criminological Theory

This course focuses on the historical theories that result in crime and delinquency.

Contemporary Culture and Worldview

This course is designed to examine issues relating to crime throughout the world. A review of worldwide philosophy as it relates to law and justice.

Juvenile Justice

This course traces the juvenile justice system including the courts system and interaction with law enforcement. Treatment and correctional strategies will be reviewed.

Victimology

This course examines the theories and history of the environmental characteristics of crime and its victims.

Crisis Management

This course develops managerial skills in the management of responding to and operational aspects of extraordinary situations.

Community Corrections

This course focuses on community treatment options in lieu of incarceration.

Articulation Agreement

Central Christian College of Kansas and Neosho County Community College

Recognizing that it is in the best of interest of both parties to facilitate the transfer of qualified students from Gwinnet College to Central Christian College of Kansas, both parties enter into an educational agreement in order to provide participating students the opportunity to pursue a baccalaureate degree at Central Christian College of Kansas. This articulation agreement is entered into by Central Christian College of Kansas and (CCC) and Neosho County Community College (NCCC).

Central Christian College of Kansas is accredited by the High Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Neosho County Community College maintains accreditation through the Kansas Board of Regents. This agreement is contingent on the current accreditation status of both schools within said associations.

Articulation & Transfer Criteria

The intent of this agreement is to facilitate the completion of a baccalaureate program for students at NCCC. The courses outlined herein have been identified as providing the student with sufficient rigor and content to facilitate successful completion of a degree at CCC.

Lower division courses (100 & 200), with a grade of C- or better, are eligible for transfer to CCC and may be applied as lower division credits toward the completion of a baccalaureate program. As appropriate and as described in this agreement, transferrable courses may be used to fulfill appropriate general education requirements and elective credits in the baccalaureate programs.

Students graduating from NCCC with an Associate of Science degree will transfer into CCC with junior standing, with CCC accepting a maximum of 66 credit hours received in transfer to the Degree Completion – Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice program.

Students transferring to CCC from NCCC may still need to complete additional degree specific requirements, if the courses received in transfer do not meet all degree specific prerequisites or graduation requirements.

Credit awarded by NCCC by experiential or exam related evaluations, will be recognized in fulfillment of the Associate degree, but will require documentation to be included in fulfillment of the baccalaureate degree requirements as articulated by CCC.

Terms and Conditions

Termination: This agreement shall commence on January 1, 2013 and can be terminated by either party at will, by written notice. Written notice of termination will incur a 60 day period whereby all students transferring prior to or during that period will be treated as if the agreement was in effect. Loss of accreditation status or recognition by CHEA or the USDE will be considered cause for immediate termination of this agreement.

Admission: This agreement does not guarantee admissions of NCCC students into CCC. Students seeking admission to CCC must abide by all existing rules, policies, and procedures for admission, as stated by the catalog of record at the time of application.

Third Party Associations: This agreement is between CCC and NCCC only and they represent the only parties empowered to enforce the terms described herein. No part of this agreement is intended to give, or shall be construed to give or grant, any benefit or right, either directly, indirectly, or otherwise, to third persons or parties unless such persons or parties are individually identified herein and expressly described as intended beneficiaries of the terms of this agreement.

Force Majeure: CCC shall be excused for any prevention, delay or stoppage of services, as outlined in this agreement, due to causes that are outside the control of the parties mentioned herein, such as natural disasters, governmental restrictions, regulations, or controls, acts of terrorism, civil unrest, war or other activities that could not be evaded through the exercise of due care.


Merger: This agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties herein described. No waiver, consent, modification or change of terms shall bind either party unless done so in writing and signed by both parties. Any waiver, consent, modification or change shall be effective only in the specific instance and for the specific purposes outlined. There are no understandings, agreements, representations, oral or written, not specified herein regarding this agreement.

Catalog of Record: Students transferring under the terms of this agreement shall be governed by the existing rules, policies, and procedures (including graduation requirements) as articulated in the CCC catalog in effect at the time of the student's admission into CCC. These requirements will continue with the student as long as continuous enrollment (enrollment in each consecutive semester after admission) with CCC is maintained.

Academic Authority: CCC reserves the right to maintain authority over all academic policies, procedures, and exceptions mentioned or not mentioned in this agreement.

This Articulation Agreement between Central Christian College of Kansas and Neosho County Community College was accepted and approved by the participating entities on the 1st day of January, 2013 which also signifies the date in which this agreement goes into effect.
